News Release on FEDERAL LIBRARY SERVICES AND CONSTRUCTION ACT

U.S. Representative <u>Carl D. Perkins</u> of Hindman has notified Kentucky Library officials that the Library Services and Construction Act passed the House of Representatives by a large majority Thursday, June 2. Debate on the Bill lasted less than two hours, and attempts to cut authorization failed overwhelmingly.

Kentucky Department of Library officials, in a statement Thursday, expressed their gratitude for the hundreds of letters that Library-minded Kentuckians have written to their Congressmen in urging their support of the Library Services and Construction Act. Representative Perkins was especially recognized for his untiring efforts on behalf of the Bill. (Vote 336-2)

Kentucky Libraries stand to reap great benefits from this Bill.

Scholarships

Several people are already being considered for scholarships to be given next fall by this organization and one scholarship has been awarded. Anyone interested in making application should do so now, addressing a letter to Miss Margaret Willis, State Librarian, Box 537, Frankfort, stating his interest and qualifications. (Scholarships are for undergraduate work only.)

The \$500 scholarship awarded went to Miss Becky Shrewsbury who has already been interviewed by Miss Willis.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Friends of Kentucky Libraries, held in Louisville, May 18, it was suggested that a complimentary membership be given to each of our scholarship people until graduation in hope that he would join at that time and become a permanent, active member. It was also suggested that scholarship people be asked for occasional progress reports to be passed on to the membership through the Newsletter. Both suggestions were approved.

Miss Judy Calhoun, one of our three present scholarship people, has written to say she is busy with her work at the University Community College at Prestonsburg where she is taking the only library course offered plus a general course. She adds, "I have not as yet decided where I am going my last two years of college... I would like to go to a small college... I plan to go to school this summer and work in a college library."

Kentucky Constitution Revision. The Board of Directors of Friends of Kentucky Libraries voted in favor of a "yes" vote for Kentucky Constitution Revision, in the fall.

Oldham County Bookmobile. Seven thousand books have already been purchased by the Department of Libraries paid for by the Friends of Kentucky Libraries, tostock this bookmobile. A list of the books so purchased will be given to this organization for its records, Miss Willis stated.

The Oldham County Fiscal Court has not yet come to a decision on the amount of money it will designate for running the bookmobile. The old library board of three members has been reorganized and now has five members. It is working to improve the whole situation; its goal - to have a library in which the community can take pride.
