# Library Openings, June and Later

The Logan-Helm Woodford County Library at Versailles, a renovation, will be opened soon, probably in June. The exact date has not yet been set.

The Meade County Library, Brandenburg, a remodeled school building, will soon set an opening date.

The Lawrence County Library at Louisa will soon be opened. This is a new building.

The Logan County Library, a new building, Russellville, will soon open.

The Whitley County Library, Williamsburg, will open in July.

Besides certain financial matters which were taken up, the following business was transacted:

After discussion, decision was made that the organization pay a bill for \$60 for repairs to keep the Estill County bookmobile running.

Definite dates were set for the meetings of the Executive Committee far enough in advance to enable to make plans. Third Tuesdays in May and September were chosen plus the usual annual meeting held in conjunction with the Kentucky Library Association during the fall - ordinarily in October.

It was agreed that one newsletter, annually, should be devoted, almost exclusively, to the matter of scholarships.

It was recorded that in Whitley County, \$100 was contributed through Friends of Kentucky Libraries toward the purchase of gasoline for a small bookmobile to transport VISTA workers going into homes to read to young children.
