Wolfe County's New Library. April 25 Opening

The new Demonstration Library opened at Campton, amid great excitement. In a street filled with bus loads of school children, green-costumed girl scouts lining the street, boy scouts marching, all citizens crowded together, the Governor spoke of what this new library will mean to the entire community and paid tribute to all who made it possible.

Following his speech and talks by community leaders, the people of Campton and Wolfe County made their first visit to the library. They saw tastefully decorated rooms, over 6,000 books, many in bright plastic jackets, framed masterpieces on the wall (to be taken out later on a library card) and records of classical and popular music. Members of the local Woman's Club served as hospitality committee. They had baked many dozens of cookies which were served with punch to the hundreds who streamed through the building. Over 300 books were circultated this first day, incredible as it seems that work could go forward during such a terrific crush and celebration. Community pride was everywhere evident! Friends of Kentucky Libraries were represented by three members. A gift of a leatherbound registration book was presented to the library by this organization. The book was duly signed by the Governor and all visitors.

The Governor received many gifts, among them a volume of poetry ("Blessed Be the Dammed", a recent publication) by Mr. William M. Reid, Poet in Residence, Lees Junior College, Jackson, Kentucky.

New Opportunity for Service Among the more than 22,000,000 persons in the United States who have physical or mental limitations, 2,000,000 physically handicapped persons cannot handle or read ordinary books or magazines. Two million more are almost homebound. It is obvious that they need special library materials and services if the library is to help them in a program of reading. Title IV (B) of the Library Services and Construction Act has provided federal funds for this year - but for planning only. This is a bare start on an important phase of library service.
